

Olorectal Cancer Alliance State of Screening Study Reveals Potentially Fatal Attitudes & Misconceptions Among Americans | Feb 26, 2025

As National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month begins this March, new survey data commissioned by the Colorectal Cancer Alliance (Alliance) and conducted by Wakefield Research reveals a troubling reality: More than half of U.S. adults (51%) prioritize household chores, such as laundry and childcare, over life-saving colorectal (colon and rectal) cancer screenings. In addition, 69% say they would rather file their taxes than get a colonoscopy. While most people understand that colonoscopies can detect cancer, according to the survey of 1,000 Americans, 57% are unaware that these screenings can actually prevent colorectal cancer by removing precancerous polyps. If Americans knew this, 98% reported they would be more likely to undergo the screening. With colorectal cancer cases rising in younger adults, these startling statistics underscore the urgent need for increased awareness and education surrounding prevention and the importance of timely screening. March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month, and Fight Colorectal Cancer (Fight CRC) is strengthening its awareness efforts with the fourth United in Blue installation in Washington, D.C. and nationwide. From March 9 to March 22, more than 27,000 blue flags will cover the National Mall, each symbolizing a person under 50 projected to be diagnosed with colorectal cancer (CRC) in the year 2030.
